It has been a few weeks since our last sermon in Galatians, so allow me to share a quick review. The Galatians had been influenced by some false teachers to believe their salvation depended on obedience to the laws God gave through Moses. Paul was shocked that they would so quickly turn from the gospel of grace. He shared his amazing testimony in which by grace alone God turned him from being a persecutor of Christians to a proclaimer of Christ. He went on to explain how the laws of Moses put us under a curse. They promise life to the one who lives it all, but the only one to ever live it all was Jesus. Now in our passage today he continues to explain how all who place their faith in Christ are free from the curses of the law for they have the righteousness of Jesus. We are heirs of the blessing God promised to the world for those with faith in Jesus.

²³ Now before faith came, we were held captive under the law, imprisoned until the coming faith would be revealed. Galatians 3:23 "Before faith came," means the revelation of the new covenant in Christ and the infilling of the Spirit. The death and resurrection of Jesus was a revelation that the New Covenant was inaugurated. Until then the Jewish people were held captive by the laws of God. The Gentiles were no better off, for their consciences were a law for them (Romans 2:14,15ⁱ). Captivity of the law was not a new idea when Paul wrote this. Rabbi called it the hedge of the law that confined them and predicted that the Messiah would break down the hedge.ⁱⁱ

The imprisonment was to sin as declared in verse 23. Jesus told us that when we sin (not if) we are the servants of sin (John 8:34ⁱⁱⁱ). Knowing the law only made us aware of our sins. Jesus Christ came as a Deliverer: and who will welcome and rejoice in a deliverer, unless he knows that there is something from which he needs to be delivered, unless he feels that he is in a wretched galling bondage, and that he cannot of himself burst his chains, that he cannot throw off his yoke? But when a man's eyes are opened to see the prison in which he is shut up, to see and feel the chains which are fast bound round his soul, and have eaten into it,—when he has learnt to see and to know that the pleasures, whatever they may be, of sin are only, like the fleshpots of Egypt, intoxicating drugs, given to him to deprive him of all sense of his captivity,—then will he long for a deliverer, and rejoice on hearing of his approach, and hail him when he comes into view, and follow him whithersoever he may lead. (J. C. Hare, M.A.)^{iv}

By referring to "the coming faith" here, Paul can't mean one could not be saved by faith before Jesus came, for he has just used the example of Abraham in verses 6-9, 14, 18. The law with its sacrifices looked forward in faith that God would provide a way for the forgiveness and removal of sins. Until the cross, the covenant for Jews to obey the law remained in effect, even though faith in God was always the means of salvation.

Verse 23 means that Christ came to liberate us from sin and the law's demands having fulfilled them for us. He then sent His Spirit to guide us into holy living. He made it possible by paying our sin debt with His life, but that does not mean we can live as we please. The Spirit can be more demanding than the laws, but the Spirit also gives us a heart that desires to obey and joy in that obedience (1 Peter 1:8^v).

²⁴ So then, the law was our guardian until Christ came, in order that we might be justified by faith. Galatians 2:24 The law was the guardian of the Jewish people for the best possible life. The law gave rules and instructions until Christ came in order that they might look forward in faith to God's Messiah and provision for sins. Without the Spirit

directing them, there needed to be general guidelines to help them understand God's holiness and the need for a Deliverer.

Guardians of children in that day were usually foreign slaves who were educated. They taught the children and looked after them. At times they could even discipline them. They were like a surrogate parent until the child matured into the likeness of their real parents. In the same way the law was given to guide Israel to represent God to the nations. But it was never intended to be their master forever. The infilling of the Spirit brings about spiritual maturity to act like the Father from the heart rather than from a set of rules (Ezekiel 11:19vi).

²⁵ But now that faith has come, we are no longer under a guardian, Galatians 3:25 Jesus liberated us from being held under the captivity of the law! Now we have what the law pointed to, the sacrifice acceptable to God for our sins, Jesus, the Lamb of God (John 1:29^{vii}). The Spirit will rarely if ever contradict the moral laws, i.e.: murder, lying, coveting, adultery; but the other laws of society, health, and worship can still be a blessing to Jews of faith. However, they are not required (Galatians 2:14^{viii}). They are not held captive by them. Righteousness has always been by faith, but now we can see exactly how that was made possible in the cross.

We should realize that our old nature prefers laws over relationship. Laws are easier to follow than walking in the Spirit. If we live by laws, we only must obey in those specific areas the laws command, and we can often find a way around the rules. Walking in the Spirit requires our total commitment but is rewarded with the fruits of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22,23^{ix}). It is the freedom of living in accord with our transformed hearts. It is living how our Creator designed us to live.

The law without the Spirit can be easily twisted into something God never intended. The Pharisees were the most devout keepers of the law and from them came the Christian killer Saul and traits seen in the legalistic Pharisees who laid heavy burdens on the people (Matthew 23:4^x).

Everything Paul has written to this point leads to this conclusion. What follows points back to it. Jew and Gentile are adopted into the family of God through faith in what Jesus did and become one body, grafted together (Romans 11:17^{xi}; Ephesians 2:12-19^{xii}). This includes not only rights and inheritance but obligations as well. In Christ we are maturing to have the heart of the Father. That is what begins when we are born again. The new covenant is a matter of the heart rather than obedience to rules (Jeremiah 31:33^{xiii}; Ezekiel 36:26,27^{xiv}).

In all Paul referred to Jesus as the "Son of God" seventeen times in his letters. Jesus is uniquely and exclusively the Son of God, equal with the Father from all eternity, unrivaled by any creatures in his essential deity. All the more remarkable, then, is Paul's description of the redeemed as "sons of God." "v

Our modern sensitivity to gender prefers the translation "children" rather than "sons". But that misses the point. Israel was referred to as children of God. In Christ, whether male or female, we are considered sons (John 1:12^{xvi}). That is because we are in Christ who is the Son! And the son is the heir of everything. In the Old Testament the daughters rarely received an inheritance. The property went to the sons. Sisters, the fact that God calls you sons here is not derogatory, rather it includes you in Christ who is *the* Son and the inheritor of all things!

When people say we are all sons and daughters of God, they are misguided. We are all made in God's image (Genesis 1:27^{xvii}). But we can only be a son of God by being in Christ our Savior, *the* Son. Those who are not in Christ may have good intentions and be nice, but they are not sons of God. They may become sons of God by faith in Jesus and His sacrifice for us, but that requires humility to receive the conviction of the Holy Spirit pointing out that we are all sinners in need of salvation (John 16:8^{xviii}). Paul uses the phrase "in Christ" 127 times in his letters. It is the same idea as the following verse.

²⁷ For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ. Galatians 3:27 The expression "Baptized into Christ" is not the act of baptism, but rather the immersion into Christ and thereby into the family of God upon salvation. The ceremony of baptism declares that you have already been baptized into Christ, meaning you have become immersed into the Lord's body (Ephesians 5:29-31^{xix}). Like dipping material into a vat of dye, you have the Jesus' color like everyone else in baptized into Him.

Putting on Christ is one of my favorite Paulisms (Ephesians 4:24^{xx}; Colossians 3:10^{xxi}; Romans 13:14^{xxii}). Christ is our covering. We are clothed in Him, God sees His righteousness and not our failures. Thank God for this grace! We put off the old man and put on Christ. Baptism pictures the old man being buried and rising to new life in Jesus' resurrection. We should be completely changed, a new creation (2 Corinthians 5:17^{xxiii}). It is not that we just try to imitate Him, but that our life is dependent on and drawn from Him. That can be true for anyone who will come to God believing His Word by faith. It is what makes the body of Christ one, for we are all in Him (John 14:20^{xxiv}). That includes a commitment to one another as well.

When I pray, I often picture in my mind's eye being clothed in Christ as I approach the throne of God (Hebrews 4:16^{xxv}). That is why we are accepted there. It is not because of our righteousness, but because of His. That is why God hears our prayers. That is why the seraphim who guard the holiness of God allow us to approach the throne of grace.

²⁸ There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. Galatians 3:28 In Christ we are one regardless of gender, race, culture, or status. We all have the Jesus' color. We are all drink of the same Holy Spirit who unites us (1 Corinthians 12:12,13^{xxvi}). So of course, there is no need for circumcision of the flesh, which is what the Judaizers were insisting on. Jews may do so to honor the covenant with their forefathers if they see it as a picture of what Jesus does in our hearts, but it earns no merit with God. In Christ, our hearts are circumcised, which is what circumcision represented (Deuteronomy 30:6^{xxvii}).

The oneness mentioned here has to do with salvation and the family of God, not roles in the church body (Titus 1:5,6^{xxviii}; 2:3,4^{xxix}). People try to apply this verse to roles in the church and sexual relations when other verses clearly tell us that is not the case. Cafeteria Christians sometimes choose single verse and misinterpret it to support their personal preference. Let us always consider the context of the passage and the full counsel of God. Scripture is to be interpreted with Scripture. The context here is clearly regarding salvation, being a part of the body of Christ. The Word of God never contradicts itself when we understand it correctly.

Leaders are servants of the flock. You can serve the flock with or without a title. How sad to leave your brothers and sisters over the desire for a title. Pastors or elders (the term is interchangeable) are servants of the congregation. We will be held accountable to God for how we led the church and what we taught (James 3:1^{xxx}). Women clearly have

an important role in the church. We all need one another in our God given roles. All of us are equally valued because we are in the Son. Whether the culture is swinging in one direction or another should not affect the Word of God. The Word of God is for every culture in every age. Christians live in the Biblical culture, for we are citizens of heaven (Philippians 3:20^{xxxi}). We will never fit in.

²⁹ And if you are Christ's, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to promise. Galatians 3:29 The people of faith are the spiritual descendants of Abraham and heirs of the blessing promised to him. That is because like Abraham, we believe the promise and are counted as righteous. That promise is that through his Descendant all the world will be blessed. We have received the blessing of the Messiah's atonement and promised Holy Spirit. Our part is to believe by faith, just like Abraham believed God. Jesus did the work that made it possible by taking our sins upon Himself.

Some of the other blessings such as the promise of the land and some of the promises through the prophets seem to be specifically to the physical descendants of Abraham. They are stated unconditionally, and some are said to be forever. But the promised blessing to the world is the great blessing that is ours forever!

4:1 I mean that the heir, as long as he is a child, is no different from a slave, though he is the owner of everything, ² but he is under guardians and managers until the date set by his father. Galatians 4:1,2 In that age you had to be approved as mature by your father before the rights of an heir were given. That seems wiser than setting an age, as people mature differently. When the father saw the son was wise enough to represent the household, he would have a ceremony toga virilas in which he placed a robe on the young man before all the relatives and friends. Paul is comparing Israel under the law to an immature child waiting for the time to come when they were ready to inherit the promises. The law was the guardian or manager until the promised Messiah came. Then we could put on the robe that is Jesus Christ. We can represent the household of God!

³ In the same way we also, when we were children, were enslaved to the elementary principles of the world. Galatians 4:3 The Jewish people were still learning spiritual truth through the law revealing man to be sinful and in need of a Savior. Just like a parent tells a child, "Don't touch this, and don't do that, and be sure to stay in the yard." The law gave rules to help keep them safe from the destructiveness of the elementary principles of the world that enslaves us, such as greed, sex, and power.

I can imagine these revelations came to Paul as he studied the Torah in the Syrian desert. Drop by drop the revelations began to come together as he saw what God was doing, keeping sin in check, revealing our need for a Savior, until the perfect time when the promised Messiah would come. He looked at Israel's repeated failure to obey the law and the idolatry that seduced them and tempted him (Romans 7:7,8xxxii). Doing so would reveal the need for the promised Messiah to redeem us.

⁴ But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, Galatians 4:4 The time set by the Father came to make a way that we might be adopted by faith. Jesus was sent into the world in the body of baby through a woman, not a man and woman, but the virgin Mary, while the Jews were still under the law. This is the gospel: God sent forth His Son and Spirit to awaken faith in us.

It was the time God set, for the population of the world was about to begin a dramatic upward turn. Romans were building roads for safer travel which would distribute the message to distant lands. Ships were sailing further. Greek language with

its exactitude was the lingua franca. Records were being preserved which would give us thousands of manuscripts of parts of the New Testament. The world was seeing the Roman and Greek gods to be powerless. Israel was under the heavy yoke of the law and seeking One who would distill it down to one basic truth. Women were praying to be the mother of the Messiah. Foreigners were looking for a king to rise in Israel. Everything was moving toward that predestined (*Kairos*) moment when God would reveal the means by which any person enters the family of God through faith. Faith was always the way of salvation, but Jesus born of a woman, born under the law became the sacrifice for our sins which was how our adoption as sons was made legally possible.

5 to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons. Galatians 4:5 The purpose of His coming was to bring about our transition from being under the law to adoption as mature sons inheriting all the rights that come with it. We had to be redeemed to be sanctified to be vessels to receive the Holy Spirit. We need to realize what our adoption means. We can now participate with our Father as we pray His will into the earth and interact with others as His hands and feet! It is time for us to put on Christ! It reminds me of the hymn, Let Others See Jesus in Me.

⁶ And because you are sons, God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, "Abba! Father!" Galatians 6:6 That full sonship and redemption enabled the Spirit to fill us, and so we cry out with the Spirit of Jesus in us, "Daddy, Father!" We are brothers and sisters of the Lord Jesus who was the only One to cry out like that (Mark 14:36xxxiii; Romans 8:15xxxiv; Hebrews 2:11xxxv)! He is the heir of all things and so we are co-heirs with Him (1 Corinthians 3:21,22xxxvi; Romans 8:17xxxvii).

⁷ So you are no longer a slave, but a son, and if a son, then an heir through God. Galatians 4:7 Now we are no longer under the old do's and don'ts with our guardian watching over our every move. We are full sons and have received our rights as sons and heirs through God's gracious provision of Jesus. This is the point Paul is trying to convey to Galatians who think they need to obey the laws of Moses to somehow please God. We can come boldly to the throne of grace in time of need and expect He will hear and help. We can choose to walk in the Spirit and crucify the flesh by donning the robe of Christ. We can speak truth in Jesus' name and call people from darkness to light. We can pray God's will into the earth. We can live as instruments of righteousness (Romans 6:13xxxviii). Unlike the world which curses God for difficulties, we cry out to God as our Abba. He disciplines us because we are sons (Hebrews 12:7,8xxix). That is the evidence that we are full sons and no longer under the tutelage of the law.

"If a son" implies not all are sons. These wonderfully freeing abilities are not ours unless we've been adopted. The only way to be adopted is to be in the Son and let the Son live in us (John 17:23^{xl}). That not only means we have a special relationship with our heavenly Father, but that we also have an inheritance incorruptible, undefiled, unfading, reserved in heaven for us, while we are kept by the power of God through faith, unto salvation ready to be revealed in the last time (Romans 8:17^{xli}; 1 Peter 1:3-5^{xlii}).

We sometimes feel like these Galatians, wondering if we shouldn't be doing more to truly be saved, wondering if this good news is really for us. It is not about being good enough. Only Jesus was good enough. His mercy and grace brought you into the family of God. I think we can all relate to this: I'm not what I should be, but I'm not who I used to be, which gives me faith He'll finish the work in me. Are you in Christ? He invites us to come to Him and receive the adoption by faith in what He has done for us.
