It's All About Jesus 1Corinthians 2:14

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Occasionally I read some work by a secular Bible scholar. It isn't that they don't have anything to add, but just that we see through such different eyes. We can look at the same text and read something totally different. Evangelicals see the Bible as God's inspired word, God breathed. (2Timothy 3:16) We try to see God's big picture. They see a man in a specific culture influenced by the world around him trying to convey something because of a certain agenda or mindset. 14 The natural person does not accept the things of the Spirit of God, for they are folly to him, and he is not able to understand them because they are spiritually discerned. 1Corinthians 2:14 (ESV)

The more I look at the Scriptures the more I see the wonder of Jesus and the hand of God throughout history pointing us to Him. Those secular scholars would think I was reading into the text something that isn't there. I believe they are missing a magnificent masterpiece.

Francis Crick, the co-discoverer of DNA and Nobel Prize winner was not known to be a believer, but in one of his presentations showed a slide of a magnificent stained glass window. The colors and symmetry were stunning. Then he showed a slide of a cross section of DNA and a gasp of wonder went up from the crowd. The believer sees the handiwork of God. The secular scientist sees a great accident. One of us is fooling our self. The more we discover of the complexity of life, the more obstinate and unreasonable the materialist becomes. (Romans 1:21-23)

The Scriptures are just as incredible as the natural world. 40 men from all walks of life over a period of 1500 years wrote 66 books that tell one story. According to Bible chronology, the story began about 4000 B.C. God created man in His image. The image is marred by man's choice to rebel against God's one command. God promised that a male seed of the woman will one day crush the head of the Tempter but in the process have His heel wounded. (Genesis 3:15) The battle began.

The story is a multi-generational story of trying to stop the seed from being born. From the first murder of the good son Abel, to the depraved world of Noah's day, man's fallen condition threatened to stop the line of the seed. (Matthew 24:22) There was the barren womb of Sarai (Genesis 17:15-16) that eventually, miraculously conceived. There was the miracle conception and battle within the womb of Rebecca. (Genesis 25:21) There was a famine that threatened to destroy the family of Jacob/Israel. (Genesis 42:2) There was enslavement and the death of the males as Egypt threw them in the Nile River as the battle intensified. (Exodus 1:22) How many nations fought with Israel once it was established and continued to attempt to wipe it out? (Joshua

7:9) But God would not allow the line of the seed to perish. Nothing could stop this One from being born. (Galatians 4:4)

Abraham was told his seed would bless the world, and so the importance of the One that would come became clearer. (Genesis 22:18) Isaac and Jacob also heard the confirmation that the seed coming through their line would bless the world. (Genesis 26:4) Judah was promised his line would produce the one to whom tribute would rightfully belong. David was told this One that would come from him would reign forever. (Jeremiah 33:17) The expectations grew. Even the Jewish Scriptures were arranged in such a way as to focus on the expectation of the coming of the seed. ¹³ Prophets predicted the place of His birth and the time of His death. (Micah 5:2), Daniel 9:25-26) They said He would be called Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace and Immanuel, God with us. (Isaiah 7:14; 9:6)

How could any one individual fill these expectations? And so man began to speculate. Perhaps He was the second King David, a magnificent ruler that would bring Israel back to its days of glory. Sounds logical to the mind of man. Maybe He would be a teacher with such wisdom that all the world would submit to His wise rule. But those who thought this way were thinking as men and forgot that He was also predicted to be the Suffering Servant who would be crushed for *our* iniquities. (Isaiah 53:10)

They did know that He would be like Moses, just as Moses predicted. (Deuteronomy 18:15) God was going to raise up from among them one like Moses to whom they must listen. Moses went into the wilderness. Jesus went into the wilderness. (Matthew 4:1) They returned with a mission from God to set the people of God free. They did the miraculous. They challenged the system. They invited all who would follow them out of bondage and through the baptism waters. They delivered the Word of God. They were often rejected, but they continued to lead the people like a shepherd as they followed God's leading. They fed the multitudes. (John 6:10) Moses brought living water from the rock. Jesus said if anyone was thirsty they could come to Him and drink. (John 7:37) When Moses died, no one could find his body. (Deuteronomy 34:6) When Jesus died, His body was raised.

Moses alone couldn't picture it all; Joshua had to finish the example. The Aramaic name for Joshua is Jesus, the salvation of God. Joshua led the people across the Jordan into the Promised Land just as Jesus leads us across the river of death and into the Promised Land of heaven. But all this is just coincidence right?

Joseph foreshadowed Jesus, loved by his father, rejected by His brothers (John 1:11), a faithful servant, unjustly imprisoned, a revealer of secrets, gave a starving world bread, raised to the right hand of the ruler, and finally revealed Himself to His brothers inviting

Isaac foreshadowed Jesus as another beloved son. His birth was a miracle. He climbed the same mountain, Mount Moriah, with the wood on which He was to be sacrificed. (Genesis 22:6) God spared Him, but not in the same way Isaac was spared. He disappeared from the scene until we see Him coming for His bride. (Genesis 24:64-65) But perhaps it's just another series of coincidences.

Let us go back and look at the pictures of Messiah's first coming. Like Noah floated away from his culture, like Abraham left Ur, like Moses left the palace, Jesus came down from heaven, left His throne to be incarnated to deliver us. (John 6:38) These foreshadows left corrupt societies, the only world they knew. Jesus left the perfect presence of God, which is a much greater sacrifice. The seed would be born as the "second Adam" that would restore the damage done by the disobedience of the first Adam. (1Corinthians 15:22)

As a human, Jesus fulfilled the prophecies of the promised one from the line of David, born in Bethlehem, brought up out of Egypt, opened the eyes of the blind, made the paralyzed to walk, (Isaiah 35:5-6) raised the dead, was a friend of sinners, gave a new interpretation of the Scriptures, proclaimed Himself to be the bread of life and the water for our thirst, the source of life, was unjustly condemned, died upon Mount Moriah as, in His own words, "a ransom for many". (Matthew 20:28) He conquered death and hell and rose again. He appeared to over 500 people (1Corinthians 15:6), promised to return, commissioned us to disciple the whole world, and then ascended to heaven. Hallelujah! What a Savior!

And now 2000 years later that Gospel has spread just as Jesus said to the uttermost parts of the earth. The Gospel has now in this age of population explosion reached the ends of the earth in almost every language (all by 2025). Millions of lives and entire nations have been transformed by this Man that came from an insignificant city, who never wrote a book, and never led an army. He submitted to the authorities and refused to flee from death and yet faith in Him has covered the planet. Could it be mere coincidence?

If the critics argued about the details of a few prophecies it would be one thing, but there are dozens. If His life never had such an effect on His followers you might wonder about the truth of His words. If Jesus' own prophecies did not come to pass certainly we could doubt Him. (Matthew 24:2) But all these things happened. So the skeptic that does not want to believe must say that the writings were made up later to match the prophecies. They have to ignore the overwhelming evidence and do so while appearing

to be intellectually honest. But their arguments don't add up. Could it be that they are taking a greater leap of faith than believers?

Our nation, the United States, was built mostly on Biblical principles to honor Jesus Christ and give men freedom to worship. God richly blessed us. We became the most prosperous nation in the history of the world. But then the intellectuals who had no desire to bow their knee to Jesus began to attack Christianity. After conquering the European educational system, they were eventually able to influence the majority of our education system. Our great universities that were formed as seminaries to train pastors, began to deny the existence of objective truth, even though it is their institution's motto.34

Those who teach our children shape the future of the nation. And we wonder why we find our nation is in crisis with one natural disaster after another. How we need to help and support our Christian students and few remaining truly faithful schools!

Our decline doesn't change who Jesus is! Denial of truth doesn't change the fact that there is truth. It doesn't change the evidence that shouts at our conscience.

Jesus is still the Word of God incarnate. (John 1:14) He still went from a humble birth and a dishonorable death to conquer death itself and redeem us from our sins. His kingdom is still sweeping the earth. He is still the King of kings and the Lord of lords. Every skeptic's knee will bow and their tongues will confess He is Lord. (Philippians 2:10-11) Just as His prophecy of the destruction of Jerusalem and the spread of His gospel to the corners of the world has come to pass, the promise of His return will come to pass as well. (Matthew 24:14)

He will come on the clouds and every eye will see Him! The nations of the earth will mourn. They rejected His invitation and they will to the end.

But for us that long for His appearing, what a glorious day our rendezvous will be. (1Thessalonians 4:17) He is the lover of our soul. He is what we've longed for our whole life. Every love has been but a shadow of His. Every earthly joy is just a taste of joy in His presence. (Psalm 16:11) We have been strangers in a strange land, but then we will finally be home. (Hebrews 11:16)

What makes heaven home is His presence. Home is where the heart is and He will so capture our hearts that we will know we are home. The Scriptures say that when we see Him we will be like Him for we will see Him as He is. (1John 3:2) One glimpse of His glory and we will be changed, transformed. We'll see the ultimate beauty, the Creator of beauty, and our soul will be filled with rapturous delight.

He stands over time and sees it even now. He sees you there, without stain, without wrinkle, pure and holy, adorned as a bride. (Ephesians 5:25-27)

I've wondered about Jesus saying that there is no marriage in heaven. (Matthew 22:30) My marriage is so important to me, I can't imagine it being no more. But the more I see the wonder of our marriage to Christ, the less it concerns me. The best of my marriage now is just a glimpse of what it will be with Jesus. We'll be so in love with Him that we will never look back.

And what will we do there? We'll be His helpmeet. We'll serve and worship Him. (Revelation 22:3) That is a letdown for those who don't know Him. But when you get to know Him, when you have discovered the joy of serving and worshiping Him, it sounds thrilling! And when you see Him face to face, you'll know it is exhilarating to do anything for Him. What high and holy service will He have for us then? It's that mysterious deep desire God has placed within the heart of man. What adventures await us on that day? We will sing our love songs to Him for sure, and He will sing over us
