Passover, our subject for last week, is the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread. It was a weeklong feast in which leaven was removed and not used in the making of bread. Our chapter today deals with three issues: the Feast of Unleavened Bread, redemption of the firstborn males, and the Presence of God that led them in a pillar of cloud by day and fire by night. Each of these is a picture of spiritual issues, and each has much to say to us today.

First, lets look at redemption of the firstborn males. Though the final plague did not say that it was only the firstborn males that died, I assume that is the case because of the description of the redemption of the firstborn in Israel is only that of the males. The firstborn male had the right of inheritance. He was to lead the family after the father died. The firstborn male represents the whole family.

Jewish men were to explain to their children the sacrifice of the firstborn animals in this way: ¹⁵ For when Pharaoh stubbornly refused to let us go, the LORD killed all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, both the firstborn of man and the firstborn of animals. Therefore I sacrifice to the LORD all the males that first open the womb, but all the firstborn of my sons I redeem.' It is as if God had said, "All firstborn males should have died. The blood of the lamb on the door caused me to pass over you, but you are as guilty as the Egyptians. You worship false gods. You have doubted my word. So I am claiming all firstborn males as mine." (Numbers 3:13) It reminded them that every family belongs to the Lord for His service.

The Hebrews were to sacrifice every firstborn male animal to the Lord to remind them of when God spared their firstborn. A donkey could be redeemed with a lamb. When a calf or lamb was eight days old, it was to be given to the Lord. (Exodus 22:30) A male child could be redeemed with five silver shekels. (Numbers 18:16)

A short time later, the Lord swapped the firstborn males for the whole tribe of Levi. An accounting showed there were more Israelite firstborn males than Levites so the balance redemption price was paid on the surplus males that were not of Levi. (Numbers 3:36-48) ¹⁴ "Thus you shall separate the Levites from among the people of Israel, and the Levites shall be mine. ¹⁵ And after that the Levites shall go in to serve at the tent of meeting, when you have cleansed them and offered them as a wave offering.

To redeem means to buy back. These firstborn male animals God claimed as His own, just as He did the firstborn boys. They were set apart for God, consecrated, holy. You could buy back the donkey, or other unclean animals, but the clean animals, the sheep or ox were to be sacrificed to the Lord. When you raise an

animal, that firstborn that comes along is special. It is precious to you. The children would naturally ask why it must be sacrificed? That was the time you remembered what happened in Egypt, the mighty power and justice of God. A father could tell his child the whole story, reminding them that they were a chosen people, redeemed by God.

In Luke chapter 2, Mary was offering the sacrifice of the poor to redeem Jesus, her firstborn child. (Luke 2:23) That is when Simeon and Anna gave the prophecies over Jesus concerning the role He was to fulfill in the saving of mankind. (Luke 2:30-32)

If you've been with us on Wednesday nights you have seen how the line of Messiah went from Eve through the Patriarchs, through Judah, and through David. Another piece of the Messiah puzzle is that He had to be a firstborn male for the firstborn male is holy to the Lord. That matches the Hebrew wordage in Genesis 3 that first predicts the coming Messiah points to a male child born of a woman. (Genesis 3:15)

That is why in the days of Jesus the Jews had careful records of the descendents of David. Women in that lineage were praying that they would be the one to be the mother of Messiah. They hoped their first child would be a male.

Redemption of the firstborn males is still a religious ceremony performed by Orthodox and Conservative Jews. It is called Pidyon ha Ben. A special silver coin was minted by Israel so that 5 of them would total the prescribed amount (117 gr.). Incidentally, the silver dollars before 1936 also contained sufficient silver so that 5 of them amounted to a little more than the redemption weight in silver. The Kohens and Levites do not redeem their firstborn males as they are the Lord's and are to be available to serve in the coming Temple. (Numbers 3:45)

So the redemption of the firstborn was to remind each generation of the great deliverance of their ancestors as it does even to this day. It was to point to the fact that the blood of the lambs did cause God to Passover them, and yet they still needed to be redeemed. It also reminds them that every family is the Lord's.

Ultimately the sacredness of the firstborn points to the fulfillment of the first promise of a Savior. He is the male seed of Eve that would crush the head of the serpent and provide complete redemption for all who will receive it. It is redemption not from sacred service, as is thought today, but rather to it.

Now we move to the Feast of Unleavened Bread. In the ancient world, each family kept a small batch of dough that had risen in a damp cloth. It would be used to transfer the yeast to a new batch of dough. After the new batch had

risen a small portion would be taken and kept for the next batch. The yeast in your bread that day may have come down from many generations earlier.

Last week we saw that yeast was a picture of the old nature we inherited from Adam. (1Corinthians 5:8) It infects each new generation and puffs them up, which is a picture of the chief sin, pride.

Sin is passed down not only in our very nature inherited from our parents, but in the patterns of life that we learned from them. (1Corinthians 15:22) Many men have learned to deal with stress by becoming angry. That is how their father reacted to frustration, and we learn how to react to life by watching how our parents deal with life. (Exodus 34:7)

If we had a promiscuous parent, we think the solution to difficulty in marriage is divorce or another relationship. The patterns move from parent to child to grandchild. Some call them generational curses. (Deuteronomy 28:18) Those patterns are very hard to break.

The Hebrews had developed some very evil patterns in Egypt. We will see them as they journey in the wilderness. They developed a pattern of complaining about their situations. (Numbers 14:29) They incorporated the worship of the Egyptian gods. (Joshua 24:14) They developed a taste for certain foods and looked to them as a source of soul satisfaction. (Numbers 11:5)

What does all this have to do with unleavened bread? That which had been passed down from generation to generation that puffed up but did not increase the substance needed to be cleansed from their homes. Each home was responsible to see that the leaven was out of their home before they started this new beginning. (2Corinthians 5:17)

The picture is very clear. As believers in Jesus, we come out of the bondage of sin and are delivered from worldliness. We must be sure our households are free of sin. The old patterns must be broken. The compromises with evil must end. What was once acceptable is no more.

⁸ You shall tell your son on that day, 'It is because of what the LORD did for me when I came out of Egypt.' When your children ask you why you don't do things that the world does, when they don't understand the restrictions you put on their lives, you have a chance to tell them that you live your life in gratitude to the One who redeemed you and gave you a new life. You can tell them how sin enslaved you and was destroying you and how Jesus became the blood stained door through which you entered and were saved. You can tell them how death has passed over you, for you have been given eternal life. You can tell them how God showed you the gods you once worshiped were powerless to help you and

were really a curse. Imagine the impact on your children when you spell out your redemption to them. (1Peter 3:15)

⁹ And it shall be to you as a sign on your hand and as a memorial between your eyes, that the law of the LORD may be in your mouth. For with a strong hand the LORD has brought you out of Egypt. Your salvation was no less a miracle than that of the Israelites. Your testimony should be always with you. Scholars argue whether or not this was to be a physical object like the phylacteries (Matthew 23:5) we read about in the New Testament or if the word is metaphorical. Either way, we are told to remember so that God's word will be in our mouth. It is to be in our minds and in our actions for we have been set free by God's strong hand.

Today we know the strong arm of the Lord is Jesus. (Isaiah 53:1) We know that our deliverance is from something far more oppressive than Egypt and Pharaoh ever were. We were in a greater bondage and our deliverance came at a greater price than the firstborn of Egypt. It came at the price of God's only begotten Son. (Galatians 3:13) How much more then should our actions show it (sign upon our hand). How much more should our minds be filled with it (a memorial between our eyes), so that His word might be in our mouth? It was with a strong hand (Jesus) that God brought us out of the worldliness that once controlled our life.

Some of us had such dramatic conversions that this concept is very clear. Even if you grew up in a Christian home and can't remember the day you placed your faith in Jesus, the deliverance is just as powerful. It was still the strong arm of the Lord (Jesus) that paid for the sin nature you inherited. It is still the power of the Holy Spirit that enables you to sweep the leaven from your home. There is still the need for you to remember the great price that was paid so that it might be in your actions and on your mind and in your words.

If you've lost the sense of this great deliverance, I want to ask you to get alone with the Lord and ask Him where you would be if it wasn't for His mercy and grace. I'll say again, that God chose to have some of us grow up in the USA in a Christian home and forced to go to church as children because He knew we were so weak we would never have made it in any other place or age. (Acts 17:26) He chose this time and place because it's the only way we would have come to Him. The great deliverance also includes time and circumstance.

Thank God you are His. Everyday praise Him for your salvation! Get a renewed sense of what it cost and how much God loves you to pay that price. Then you'll want to be sure your home is swept clean of the leaven of sin. Then you'll want to tell your children when they ask why you live the way you do.

Remember you were redeemed. Remember that sin is supposed to be purged from your home. This was to be a lasting festival because we forget. I think we'll even be doing it in heaven to keep refreshing in mind and heart what God has done for us. (Zechariah 14:16)

Finally, God led them. ¹⁷ When Pharaoh let the people go, God did not lead them by way of the land of the Philistines, although that was near. For God said, "Lest the people change their minds when they see war and return to Egypt." If they had gone north along the Via Maris, what was then the Way of Horus, there were numerous Egyptian military outposts. It would have only taken a few short weeks to go that route. But God knew their hearts. He had to prepare them for what they would face. There were lessons to be learned.

19 Moses took the bones of Joseph with him, for Joseph had made the sons of Israel solemnly swear, saying, "God will surely visit you, and you shall carry up my bones with you from here." How did Joseph know? The prophetic words to his great-grandfather Abraham had been passed down. (Genesis 15:16) They knew it would be 400 years before they left Egypt, but Joseph showed faith in the prophecy by asking them to take his bones with them to the Promised Land. God made a covenant with his forefathers to give them the land of Canaan. Joseph knew God was faithful to keep His word. I wonder if his command was as much to remind the people of the promise as it was to see his bones buried with his ancestors?

I want you to picture this huge crowd coming out of Egypt, overflowing the roads. There would have been herds and carts loaded with family possessions. The elderly and small children probably road on animals and carts while the rest walked. The men were probably armed and took positions on the perimeter.

There before them rose a giant column of cloud. They were no longer just following Moses. Now they had a visible manifestation of the presence of God going before them.

²¹ And the LORD went before them by day in a pillar of cloud to lead them along the way, and by night in a pillar of fire to give them light, that they might travel by and by night.

²² The pillar of cloud by day and the pillar of fire by night did not depart from before the people. That first evening as the sky began to darken that great column became ablaze and lit the night sky. What a nightlight! The Lord Himself! The psalmist tells us that cloud shaded them from the sun during the heat of the day. (Psalm 105:39)

The lesson is clear in this last point as well. God must guide us! If we are ever to make it to our Promised Land of heaven, we must follow His lead. We don't have a cloud to follow, we have something even better, the Word of God and the

indwelling Holy Spirit. (John 16:7) He guides us in the details of life, teaching us what to say and how to say it. (John 12:49) He guides where we go and what we do. He has become the Word on our hand and on our foreheads.

Let's review the lessons. The firstborn was to be redeemed. Never forget you are redeemed. Remember what Jesus did for you. It is your testimony! Tell your children.

Get rid of the leaven. Sin must go! If you are going to start a new life, sin must be purged, not just from your life, but from your entire home. Remember, it is our grateful response for our redemption.

And lastly, His presence will guide you. If you got the first two points, you know the need for the third. We can't go back to following our old desires. We must let God lead us all the way to the Promised Land. We are redeemed to be sanctified to follow where God leads. That is the record of what God did for them, and it foreshadowed what God is doing for you today. Remember, you were redeemed to serve, so get rid of sin, and follow where God leads. Three simple lessons, rich in significance, that we are to remember and pass on to our children. Have you? Will you?
