Let us review what we have covered so far to get an idea of the flow of the book to this point. Chapter one introduced Jesus, the churches, and their angels. Chapters two and three were the letters from Jesus to the seven churches. Three letters included praise for what they were doing and warnings about compromise with the world. Two were about to die if they did not change. Two had no faults mentioned. Chapters 4 and 5 included a heavenly throne room scene where Jesus as the Lamb of God took the scroll with seven seals that are opened in chapter 6, an outline of the way God was dealing with the world.

In chapter 7 the 144,000 are sealed and through chapters 8-9 the six trumpet plagues are sent out damaging portions of the earth and bringing torment to those not sealed by God. In chapter 10 John is given the little scroll and is commissioned to give the rest of the revelation. In chapter 11 the two witnesses declare the truth, call down plagues, and there is persecution. They are killed but they rise after three days. The last half of chapter 11 is the seventh trumpet and a declaration that Christ has taken His great power and begun to reign. In chapters 12 and first half of 13 we read of the Antichrist and persecution of believers, but the saints are carried to a place of refuge. The last half of chapter 13 we were introduced to the false prophet and told of the mark of the beast. Now in this chapter we will read of the 144,000 surrounding Jesus on Mount Zion and of the harvest of the firstfruits followed by the harvest of those to be trodden in the winepress. Chapters 15 and 16 will tell of the vials of wrath poured out upon the earth.

We should note that 7:9-17, 11:15-19, and these verses in chapter 14 each sound like a wrap, like it is finished, and yet more is written. This may mean that we are seeing what took place previously from different angles. It could mean there is a spiritual victory and what follows is the cleaning up. Or it could mean the church is called home represented by Christ reigning as king, which is the place of refuge for the 144,000 with Jesus on Mount Zion. Or each could be a forward look to the conclusion to encourage the readers to persevere.

The first readers were seeing this played out in an intermediate fulfillment under emperor Domitian. They would be encouraged by what we are about to read. It reminds us of the story of the rich man and Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31). They could relate to Lazarus, and the inability to earn money to feed their families that we saw in the previous chapter because they refused to worship the Roman gods (13:17<sup>i</sup>). But they are about to hear why it is important to persevere to the end.

17 Then I looked, and behold, on Mount Zion stood the Lamb, and with him 144,000 who had his name and his Father's name written on their foreheads. Revelation 14:1 I looked and behold - announces a new section in Revelation. The first five verses are about the song of the redeemed. All believers are sealed (Ephesians 1:13,14<sup>ii</sup>; Revelation 3:12<sup>iii</sup>). We stand with the Lamb on the heavenly Mount Zion (Hebrews 12:22<sup>iv</sup>; Galatians 4:26<sup>v</sup>). That is quite a contrast to the beast who stands on the sand of sea. Believers in the first couple of centuries called the Mount of Olives the new Mount Zion for they believed that Jesus died, was buried, and rose there. Indeed, His death, burial, and resurrection made it possible for us to stand with Him on the heavenly Mount Zion. Are these a subset of believers such as martyred Jews during the tribulation? Some people interpret verses 4 and 5 that way. My understanding is that in the same manner that all who follow the beast get his seal, so all believers in Christ are sealed by the

Lamb. I take the number of 144,000 to be symbolic of all believers (12x12x1000). These five verses are meant to encourage the reader. In 12:17<sup>vi</sup> the beast stood on the sand, but here the Lamb stands on Mount Zion. It is a far superior position for the battle that lay ahead. After reading about the Antichrist being victorious over the saints from the earth (13:7<sup>vii</sup>), we need to read where we end up.

What is the Lamb's and the Father's name on our foreheads? Are we all going to get a tattoo? Some slaves in that day did get a forehead tattoo of their owner's name. But when we go back to the original use in Exodus, we find that being marked on our hand and forehead was symbolic of our behavior. When the Jews celebrated Passover, it was said to be a sign on their hand and forehead (Exodus 13:9viii). When they gave the first born of their flocks to the Lord it was also a sign on their hand and forehead (Exodus 13:16<sup>ix</sup>). The way the word forehead is used in prophetic passages is similar to the way we refer to the face. "I can see it written all over your face." It is not a tattoo but the glow of one's countenance (Ecclesiastes 8:1<sup>x</sup>). And remember that a name in Hebrew represents the character. Sometimes when I meet someone, I can see on their face that they are a follower of Jesus. When we stand with the Lamb on heavenly Mount Zion, the characteristics of the Lamb and the Father will be on our faces. It is similar to what John wrote in his first letter. <sup>2</sup> Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. 1 John 3:2

As mentioned earlier this is similar to the preview of Jesus' victory that we saw at the end of chapter 7 and 11. I see it as a reminder of the reward for enduring. We are reading about the most extreme conditions the world has ever faced (Matthw 24:21<sup>xi</sup>), but then we get a glimpse of why we keep on keeping on. We know where we are headed. The end of the book is interspersed throughout Revelation so that we do not become discouraged with what we are reading.

Both Paul and Peter quote Isaiah 28:16xii regarding Jesus as the stone God has placed on Zion. I think this is a clear allusion to the Daniel 2 vision. King Nebuchadnezzar had a disturbing dream. He asked his wise men to tell him the dream and the interpretation or be torn to pieces. When Daniel heard about the order, he went to prayer with his friends and in a night vision he saw the king's dream. There was a frightening image of a man with a gold head, silver chest, bronze thighs, iron legs, and feet of iron and clay. Each part represented the kingdoms to follow Babylon, which was the head. The iron represented Rome, the empire under which the recipients of Revelation were suffering persecution. A stone was cut out of a great mountain, and it struck the image in the feet and the image crumbled and blew away. The stone became a mountain that filled the earth (Daniel 2:44,45<sup>xiii</sup>). Paul and Peter declare that stone is Jesus (Romans 9:33xiv; 1 Peter 2:6xv). For the recipients of the letter, this first verse would speak to them that though they are martyred, they will be with Jesus when he ends the kingdoms of man, and the kingdom of God fills the earth. The message has been the same for all who suffer under the antichrist nations of this world. Endure this fallen world and you will go to your reward.

Paul tells us in Ephesians  $2:6^{xvi}$  that we are presently seated with Christ in the heavenly realms. That means that we are with the Lamb on Mount Zion even now. When He stands, it is because He is returning to judge the earth. We will stand with Him and join Him on white horses as He slays His enemies according to chapter 19 (19:13- $16^{xvii}$ ).

<sup>2</sup> And I heard a voice from heaven like the roar of many waters and like the sound of loud thunder. The voice I heard was like the sound of harpists playing on their harps, and they were singing a new song before the throne and before the four living creatures and before the elders. No one could learn that song except the 144,000 who had been redeemed from the earth. Revelation 14:2,3 This is the fulfillment of Isaiah's prediction. <sup>10</sup> And the ransomed of the LORD shall return and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain gladness and joy, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away. Isaiah 35:10 This makes it clear that 144,000 is a symbolic number of all of the redeemed. ESV uses the word redeemed at the end of verse three, but the Greek word is more commonly translated as purchased. We were purchased out of the earth by the blood of Jesus (5:9xviii). That was the ransom that He paid to see us set free from slavery to sin. The angels in heaven cannot sing this song for they never fell, and the angels who did fall are not redeemable. The unsaved cannot sing it for they never experienced redemption. But we will sing it with great joy and gratitude for we were purchased by the most precious, sinless blood of Jesus. We are forgiven. It should be the new song of the church throughout the ages for even now we have come to Mount Zion (Hebrews 12:22<sup>iv</sup>), but the song will crescendo when we are complete, all the saints together as one (Hebrews 11:40xix).

They have come to Mount Zion on eagle's wings. Could it be that this is their place of refuge from the beast for 1260 days, the last half of the final seven years when the vials of wrath are poured out. At the end of that time, they will follow Jesus to the battle of Armageddon (19:11-16<sup>xx</sup>; Psalm 2:6-9<sup>xxi</sup>; Jude 14,15<sup>xxii</sup>). They will not need to fight, for the battle belongs to the Lord (2 Chronicles 20:15<sup>xxiii</sup>).

The description of the sound of their singing is like that of Jesus' voice in chapter 1 verse  $15^{xxiv}$ . When God spoke to Jesus in an audible voice in the Gospels, some said it thundered (John  $12:29^{xxv}$ ). Thunder and harpists sound like an oxymoron, but perhaps he is saying melodic low bass tones. It is the song of the redeemed. The song of the redeemed is "a voice." They sing as one, and they sound like Jesus because they follow and listen to Him. No longer weak and persecuted, together at last they ROAR!

With their thundering voices they sing a new song. In Scripture, new songs were sung when hearts were overflowing with the goodness of God (Psalm 33:3<sup>xxvi</sup>). The people of God are in heaven with Jesus. We know that because verse 2 tells us John heard the "voice from heaven." What the Antichrist sees as a victory in eliminating the followers of Jesus on earth, we will see as a great victory for us. Like our Savior, we lay down our lives and find life in doing so (Matthew 16:25<sup>xxvii</sup>). We will realize the victory in the completion of the bride and that we made it home by the grace of God.

<sup>4</sup> It is these who have not defiled themselves with women, for they are virgins. It is these who follow the Lamb wherever he goes. These have been redeemed from mankind as firstfruits for God and the Lamb, <sup>5</sup> and in their mouth no lie was found, for they are blameless. Revelation 14:4,5 Four things are said of the 144,0000. They are virgins. In the spiritual sense, "virgins" means free of idolatry, faithful to the Lord (2 Corinthians 11:2<sup>xxviii</sup>). Both Old Testament and New Testament use this figurative language. Israel was often accused of whoring after other gods, meaning being idolatrous (Jeremiah 3:2,3<sup>xxix</sup>; Hosea 4:12<sup>xxx</sup>). Unfaithful even in our language can imply either a sexual connotation or any lack of consistency to one's duties or promises. This expression is a contrast with the harlot Babylon in chapter 18 and those who are committed to her idols.

To be a virgin in this spiritual apocalyptic language is to be faithfully waiting for Christ to return. Jesus used the expression in Matthew 25 in the parable of the ten virgins (Matthew 25:1<sup>xxxi</sup>). Satake notes that in the only other places in the text where saints surround Christ (7:9<sup>xxxii</sup>, 17<sup>xxxiii</sup>; 19:8–9<sup>xxxiv</sup>), it is always the whole redeemed community that does so. xxxv. But we know for sure that is the correct interpretation because verse 8<sup>xxxvi</sup> tells us that sexual immorality is drinking of the wine of Babylon's passion. That is to live for the things of this world, which is to side with the antichrist forces.

To follow the Lamb is to be a disciple of Jesus. <sup>26</sup> If anyone serves me, he must follow me; and where I am, there will my servant be also. If anyone serves me, the Father will honor him. John 12:26 That begs the question, are you following Him wherever He leads? Are you with Him? Is your life dedicated to serving Him? If you desire the honor that comes from God alone, that is what we must do. That is the same concept as a spiritual virgin, for the idolatry of this world's things has been put out of our lives. Jesus said in Matthew 10:38 <sup>38</sup> And whoever does not take his cross and follow me is not worthy of me. To follow the Lamb wherever He goes then means that Like the sacrificial Lamb, they offer their lives up in sacrifice to God (cf. Romans. 12:1xxxvii). Not only do they follow Jesus' teaching and identify with his redemptive work, but they also imitate his faithfulness in the midst of suffering and persecution.xxxviii Are you a spiritual virgin, or are you intimate with the world? We should ask ourselves each day if we are living solely for this world and what it offers, or living to glorify our Savior.

Firstfruits - the Greek word is an offering to God. Several verses apply the term to all believers who have given themselves to the Lord (2 Thessalonians 2:13xxxix; James 1:18xl). The Old Testament uses firstfruits in the same way referring to faithful Israel. The idea of reaping people like a harvest comes from Joel 4:13xli. But the Joel passage is a reaping for judgment like we will see in verses 17-20 of this chapter. However, before those verses there is an earlier harvest in verses 14-16. That would be a harvest of firstfruits unto the Lord referred to as the redeemed or purchased in verse 4. Jesus used the word "harvest" in that sense in John 4:35-38xlii. The author of Hebrews uses the term firstborn which is the firstfruits describing us with Jesus on Mount Zion. Hebrews 12:22-23 22 But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, 23 and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God, the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, We are purchased for God and the Lamb. We will all be in one harvest or the other (Matthew 13:30xliii, 39-42xliv). There are no other groups.

"In their mouth no lie was found, for they are blameless." These pure ones speak truth that Babylon denies: Jesus is Lord! We are sinners. Only Jesus offers salvation! The truth of God and what He has done for us is found in the Bible. We do not compromise our speech to fit in with the world. That is why the world hates us, not because we are obnoxious, or rude, or insurrectionists, but because we speak the truth (John 15:18,19xlv). They hate us because we warn them that they have set their hearts on a lie.

And because we have the righteousness of God in Christ (2 Corinthians 5:21<sup>xlvi</sup>) we are blameless (Jude 24<sup>xlvii</sup>). We are certainly not perfect, but our sins are covered and we are being sanctified. God sees us clothed in Christ and calls us perfected (Hebrews 10:14<sup>xlviii</sup>). All of these expressions are applied to all redeemed believers in other Scripture passages. This also makes me wonder if there is a purification of the church because of the difficulty of those days. Certainly, those who are Christians because it is

cultural or tradition or for the false idea that it will make life easier will have fallen away. In fact, 2 Thessalonians 2:3<sup>xlix</sup> tells us that there will be apostacy that comes first. ESV translates it as rebellion and KJV as "a great falling away." We see it happening in many churches already. They preach something completely contrary to Scripture, such as coming to Christ will make you rich and happy. Others preach a compromise with sin saying God loves us and understands and allows our passions. The doctrines of demons lead people away from genuine faith in what Jesus has done for us. It puts self first and Jesus as genie in the sky who gives us whatever we desire. It is going to be so prominent that when someone uses the term Christian, the world will think of those who believe the false teaching. Meanwhile true followers of Christ will be labeled as dangerous fanatics. But in God's eyes we are faithful followers of Jesus who proclaim the truth, and are blameless, for we are clothed in Christ (Romans 13:14<sup>1</sup>; Revelation 7:13,14<sup>li</sup>).

<sup>6</sup> Then I saw another angel flying directly overhead, with an eternal gospel to proclaim to those who dwell on earth, to every nation and tribe and language and people. Revelation 14:6 If the rapture has taken place at any point up to this time and the people on Zion with Jesus are those coming out of the tribulation that we read about in chapter seven (7:14<sup>lii</sup>), then who are these to whom the angel is proclaiming the gospel? Will there still be those on the earth who have not taken the mark of the beast? Either God is making their judgment clear so that they can never say that they did not know, or there are still those who during the wrath being poured out will realize their guilt and turn to Christ like the thief on the cross (Luke 23:40-42<sup>liii</sup>). While we will read that those who remain curse God to the end, there must be some who hear the angel and repent. Why would an angel need to proclaim the gospel if we were still on the earth? But since we are with God on Mount Zion, there may be some who will still be saved.

God does not want any to perish (2 Peter 3:9<sup>liv</sup>). The pouring out of wrath that we will read about in chapter 16 is so all inclusive and destructive that even the hardest will have to think twice. God will use any means to bring us to repentance. And yet there will still be most of those who remain who are so hardened that they curse God instead (16:11<sup>lv</sup>). If the goodness of God will not bring them to repentance (Romans 2:4<sup>lvi</sup>), He will bring judgment to open their eyes. That is why I believe that those in hell would never want to be in heaven despite the constant agony where the worm never dies, and the fire is never quenched (Mark 9:47,48<sup>lvii</sup>).

God has revealed to John a stark contrast that is meant to encourage those suffering at the end of the first century. You can live for this world and be separated from God, or you can accept the suffering that the world inflicts on us because of our love for Jesus and join Him on Mount Zion where at His right hand are pleasures forevermore (Psalm 16:11<sup>lviii</sup>). The message applies to every generation and will certainly be the call during the great tribulation. Man's kingdoms will fall. God's kingdom is forever! The Lamb always wins!
