Spiritual Disciplines: Prayer Colossians 4:2 bible-sermons.org January 6, 2013

We are beginning a new series on spiritual disciplines. This is not intended to be laundry list of things you have to add to your schedule. Nor is this series intended to be a formula for being a godly person. It isn't a list of behaviors you must perform to earn God's favor, but rather things that we practice on a regular basis that can help our spiritual growth into Christian maturity. (1Tim.4:7)

This series is about some of the disciplines that have been observed in the life of Jesus and His followers. There are things that Jesus did on a regular basis. We can observe these same things in successful men and women of God. By successful I don't mean they were famous or that they had a large number of followers, but that their life bore fruit because of the depth of their relationship with God. As you've heard me say many times before, doing flows out of being.

We are all given spiritual gifts and some are anointed for particular ministries (Ephesians 4:6-7), but our effectiveness in exercising those gifts will be proportional to our relationship with God. Samson's life illustrates an anointed person that was given a great gift. Though he used it for its intended purpose, he was not a good example or as effective as he could have been had he disciplined his life. (Judges 16:30)

The one question we could ask almost any believer and be certain of negative response is this, "Are you satisfied with your prayer life?" Pause for a moment and think of what your response would be. Now ask yourself why that is so. Let me first say that I do not mean to put you on a guilt trip. If you think you are fully satisfied with your prayer life, I'm concerned about you. Our dissatisfaction is spiritually healthy as long as we do not grow calloused to it. As followers of Jesus we should long to be more intimate with our Savior. That longing is for our unbroken fellowship with Him in heaven. (Revelation 22:3-4) It spurs us to deepen our prayer life now. If you think you have reached the fullness of that intimacy already, you aren't on a guilt trip; you are more likely on a pride trip.

These disciplines we will be looking at are not stripes on a uniform that make you a super saint. They are part of a healthy and growing relationship with our Savior. Prayer is one of the essential disciplines for our growth in Christ. We instinctively know how vital it is to us. It is the spiritual breath of the believer. In every influential Christian's biography, you will find that they rose early to spend time in prayer. They learned this from the gospel account of Jesus. After a very taxing day, Mark tells us of Jesus, 35 And rising very early in the morning, while it was still dark, he departed and went out to a desolate place, and there he prayed. Mark 1:35 (ESV) If Jesus needed to spend time with His Father in prayer, what does that tell us about our need? He spent an entire

night in prayer before choosing the twelve. (Luke 6:12) We see Him breaking out in prayer before the resurrection of Lazarus (John 11:41), for the disciples during that last week (John 17:1), before going to the cross (Mark 14:34-35), and even on the cross.

By looking at the prayers of Jesus we can see several types of prayers. Not much is said about His morning prayer time, except that He found an isolated place. He wanted to be free from distraction. That is perhaps one of the most helpful ingredients of our prayer life, freedom from distraction. We live in a very different world in the sense that we have a watch on our wrist, a phone in our pocket and some of those have our daily schedule with warning tones, calls, texts, emails, not to mention our own family and their needs. All the busyness can keep us from taking that quiet undistracted time to share our heart and listen to His heart and direction for us. I would recommend that you find a place that is free from all those distractions. If possible, leave your phone and watch behind. (Matthew 6:6)

As we enter into that quiet space, we'll find the need to discipline our mind. Your thoughts will jump all over. It helps to pray out loud, which is another reason to find an isolated place. You might start with the Lord's Prayer with the freedom to elaborate on any line in it. Many people use the acronym ACTS as a guide, adoration, confession, thanksgiving, and supplication. You'll find many of the prayers in Scripture roughly follow this pattern. It can help to keep us on track and put first things first. Another aid to help in concentration is to picture yourself coming before the throne of Almighty God. We read about it in Revelation chapter 5. (Revelation 5:8) That is what you are doing after all. To keep that picture in your mind will help you maintain an attitude of reverence.

Adoration is seen in the first line of the Lord's Prayer. "Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed by thy name." (Matthew 6:9) The name of the Lord is all that the Lord is in His nature. This line is declaring the holiness of God's character and declaring that it should be held in reverence. You can adore God for the ways you have seen His nature expressed in your life recently, or for what you have read of Him in His word.

Confession is a part of prayer we often avoid, and yet it is so needed for our spiritual growth. (Psalm 32:5) The Holy Spirit will convict us of areas in which we have failed. Spiritual progress is made when we acknowledge where we have failed. When we confess our shortcomings, it not only relieves us of guilt, but it reminds us of patterns that need to change in our life. When we come to the final portion of our prayer time, we can ask for the strength to walk in freedom from the sins we have confessed. Confession gives us an open line of communication with God. Unconfessed sin will hinder our prayer life.

(Proverbs 28:13)

hoever conceals his transgressions will not prosper, but he who confesses and forsakes them will obtain mercy.

Thanksgiving naturally follows confession, for we have the promise that when we confess our sins, God is faithful and just to forgive us and cleanse us from all unrighteousness. (1John 1:9) That is something to be thankful for. Thanksgiving is the necessary and (should be) natural response to God's gracious and merciful nature. The prayers we have seen answered, the privilege of prayer, the physical and spiritual provision we receive should all evoke a spirit of thanksgiving. Believers have an endless list of things for which to be thankful. (Psalm 86:12)

Supplication is often how we begin our prayer time, but is best here at the end. After adoring God for who He is and confessing our sins, and thanking Him for all He is and does will often change the requests we want to present to God. There are so many we know who have serious needs or illness. There are countries in turmoil, brothers and sisters that are being persecuted, ministries that need support and encouragement, and on and on. (Ephesians 6:18)

Don't think it is wrong to pray for yourself. God encourages us to pray for wisdom (James 1:5), His strength and anointing on your life, your daily needs, spiritual growth and that your desires conform to His desires. (Matthew 6:11; Psalm 40:8) Prayer to help you be all that God has called you to be is not selfish; it is for the glory of God.

A prayer list has been helpful to many for the supplication portion of their prayer time. To list the people and situations in order of their importance can also help to focus and aid your memory. We often tell someone we will pray for them, but do we really follow up? They should go on our list at least for a time. Our list should change over time as needs change. But never let the list limit your prayers. Be sure to search your heart and let the Spirit of God lead you. He may bring things to your mind that you would never have thought of on your own.

To the ACTS pattern, I would add a time of silence before the throne. You've had your say, now let God have His. Communion implies two sides. We have one mouth and two ears for a reason. Listen for His prompting in your heart. Sometimes a Scripture may come to mind for you to contemplate.

A word of caution is in order here. This is not a time for you to hear from God for others, or to step into the role of the Old Testament prophet. This is a time for *you* to draw near to God. (Psalm 73:28) We need to discern the difference from our own inner voice and the voice of the Lord. It takes time, just as baby learns to speak and understand a language. Whenever you think you are hearing self-exalting things or that which would condemn others, you can be fairly certain you are hearing your own spirit. The Lord will not feed your pride. (Proverbs 8:13) Hearing from the Lord always results

Sometimes an incident will be brought to mind in which we didn't represent the Lord as we should have. It may be an opportunity to correct the impression we gave others or to do something differently the next time you are in a similar situation. The Holy Spirit may convict us during this time of silence regarding something we never even thought twice about. We'll have more on this subject of waiting on the Lord.

Another type of prayer we see Jesus employing was the sudden calling out to the Lord. One of Jesus' short prayers was simply, "Father, glorify your name!" (John 12:28) Another of Jesus brief prayers expressed His thanks for the way God was working in the world. ²⁵ At that time Jesus declared, "I thank you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that you have hidden these things from the wise and understanding and revealed them to little children; ²⁶ yes, Father, for such was your gracious will. Matthew 11:25-26 (ESV) He was rejoicing in the gracious aspect of God's revelation to the humble. He couldn't hold that thought in and so He turned it into an audible expression of gratitude to God. Would that seem strange to you, if someone you were talking with suddenly prayed aloud a short prayer of thanks for their appreciation of the way God was working? Would you be hesitant to do the same? Why? We should have the freedom to do whatever the Spirit of God prompts us to do. I call these short spontaneous prayers "bullet prayers". We can send them up all day long.

Once again I want to emphasize that this is not an exercise that makes you holy. It is the freedom and discipline of doing what is good at the leading of the Holy Spirit. It will often be unique, just as Jesus' prayers were.

That said, I should also point out that there is a place for memorized prayers. Evangelicals tend to look down on wrote prayers of Anglican and Catholic churches. However, the Lord Himself gave us one, The Lord's Prayer, which was to be put to memory and prayed together. You'll notice that the pronouns are plural, "*Our* Father...forgive *us* as *we...*" (Matthew 6:12) While we desire to pray from the heart and avoid reciting something that means little to us (Matthew 6:7), some written prayers express exactly what is on our heart better than we could. Writing out a prayer can be a way to really think deeply about just what you want to say to the Lord. I would encourage you to occasionally take time to write your prayer down.

There is a wonderful little book called The Valley of Vision. It is a compilation of the prayers of Puritans from several centuries ago. The Call to Worship came from that book. That particular prayer just expressed my heart so perfectly that I pray through it

most evenings. I'm sure I'll move on to the other prayers in the book. As we go through stages in our spiritual growth, we will find our prayers and the emphasis of them changes.

Another type of Jesus' prayers was an intense time of seeking the Father's heart. The author of Hebrews describes it this way, ⁷ In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to him who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverence. Hebrews 5:7 (ESV) "Loud cries and tears with reverence" is quite a description. This is no half-hearted prayer. There are times in our life when our hearts are torn. The Psalms are great examples of these. God is not offended when we voice our fears and doubts to Him reverently. Where else would we take them? When we are honest about our condition and lay these at His feet, He helps us work through them. He helps us surrender to His will and face what lies ahead. We might as well be honest with God, for we cannot hide our heart from Him. (Hebrews 4:13)

I think these are the prayers that are most acceptable to God. They are the most sincere ones and without pretense. (Luke 18:13) We are rarely distracted by externals when we cry out like this with our whole heart. These difficult times are when we are desperate to hear from Him as well. Peter called these times of testing that prove the genuineness of our faith as more valuable than refined gold. (1Peter 1:6-7) The Psalmists almost always ended their prayers of desperation with words of confidence in God and His help that they knew by faith was coming. (Psalm 42:11)

Faith is an essential ingredient to prayer. (Mark 11:23) Faith is not just believing you are right; it is confidence in the will and Word of God. Faith grows by reading and meditating on the Word of God. (Romans 10:17) The promises to those who pray God's will with faith are staggering! (Matthew 21:22)

One of the most prolific writers on the topic of prayer, E.M. Bounds, addresses the issue of these open ended promises. "If Jesus dwells at the fountain of my life; if the currents of his life have displaced and superseded all self-currents; if implicit obedience to him is the inspiration and force of every movement of my life, then he can safely commit the praying to my will, and pledge himself, by an obligation as profound as his own nature, that whatsoever is asked shall be granted." When our lives are surrendered to the will of God and our hearts are to please Him, we invite the Spirit of God to lead us to pray His will into the earth.

Prayer should be the continual breath of our spirit as we walk with our Lord. (1Thessalonians 5:17) We breathe out our adoration, confession, thanks, and supplication. We breathe in His directions, comfort, and peace. Whether it is in our

quiet place where we tune all else out, or the overflow of our heart in anguish or in joy as we are going about our day, prayer should be as natural to a believer as speaking to one's spouse. Since Jesus calls us His friends (John 15:15), brothers (Romans 8:29), and bride (Revelation 19:7), consider the freedom we have to speak with Him about all we are experiencing (Ephesians 3:12), and to hear the wisest counsel of all. Without the spiritual breath of prayer, our spirit will suffocate. Breathe! Questions
