The Second Coming 2-5-06

Matthew 24:29-35 (NIV)

²⁹ "Immediately after the distress of those days "'the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light; the stars will fall from the sky, and the heavenly bodies will be shaken.' ³⁰ "At that time the sign of the Son of Man will appear in the sky, and all the nations of the earth will mourn. They will see the Son of Man coming on the clouds of the sky, with power and great glory. ³¹ And he will send his angels with a loud trumpet call, and they will gather his elect from the four winds, from one end of the heavens to the other. ³² "Now learn this lesson from the fig tree: As soon as its twigs get tender and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. ³³ Even so, when you see all these things, you know that it is near, right at the door. ³⁴ I tell you the truth, this generation will certainly not pass away until all these things have happened. ³⁵ Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away.

Remember that this sermon given to the disciples on the Mount of Olives, called the Olivet Discourse, (Matthew 24-25) began with a question from the disciples. They asked what would be the sign of His coming. (Matthew 24:3) They were referring to Jesus taking the power and authority as supreme ruler of Israel. (Jeremiah 23:5-6) The sermon last week covered Jesus' predictions of what would precede the sign. They appeared to be fulfilled in 70 A.D. but with an ultimate fulfillment in the last days.

All these predictions that Jesus gave of impending troubles were not a new teaching. It came right out of the prophets. It is referred to as the time of Jacob's trouble. (Zechariah 14:2) Israel had set those predictions aside and clung to the more promising ones. You cannot blame them. If you read Isaiah 61 that Jesus read in the Nazareth synagogue and declared to be about Him (Luke 4:18-21), it flows right into the predictions of the Messiah bringing God's vengeance and reigning over a restored nation that is honored and respected in the earth. Jesus stopped reading right in the middle of verse two where the predictions of the Second Coming begin. Let us turn in our Bibles to that passage and read those first two verses. (Isaiah 61:1-2) Now, with your finger in the Isaiah passage, look at Luke 4:18-21. Do you see where He stopped? By reading certain prophecies we get the impression the Jews had in that day. They thought the Messiah would show up and defeat all the physical enemies of Israel and set up the kingdom of God. (Isaiah 11:1-4)

Jesus' discourse to the disciples was meant to correct their interpretation. Between the first coming of the Messiah and restoration of the throne of David would come these horrific events that the prophets spoke of in other passages. (Jeremiah 30:7) Jesus put them all together in their proper order. The Messiah comes and is killed for the sins of the people as predicted by Daniel (Daniel 9:24) and the suffering servant songs of Isaiah. (Isaiah 53:6) The Temple is destroyed. (Daniel 9:26) There are increasing natural and man-made disasters. False messiahs and prophets deceive many. Followers of Jesus are hated and hunted down like criminals. The Gospel is preached in all the world, THEN the Son of Man returns like lightening, visible to all.

Commented [notes9]: 6 We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all. Isaiah 53:6 (NIV)

Commented [notes10]: 26 After the sixty-two 'sevens,' the Anointed One will be cut off and will have nothing. The people of the ruler who will come will destroy the city and the sanctuary. The end will come like a flood: War will continue until the end, and desolations have been decreed. Daniel 9:26 (NIV) ²⁹ "Immediately after the distress of those days "the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light; the stars will fall from the sky, and the heavenly bodies will be shaken.' After all those horrific events take place in which a great percentage of the earth's population dies (Revelation 6:8), and there are signs in the heavens. Jesus is quoting from two passages in Isaiah that refer to this time. (Isaiah 13:10, [34:4) Some say this is apocalyptic language, that this is only symbolic of spiritual powers in upheaval. I believe it is literal and spiritual. Great sunspots could easily darken the sun for a time and that would result in the moon not reflecting the light, which could coincide with the high visibility of meteor showers. If you compare this with some of the descriptions in Revelation, you can see how these predictions match with Jesus' revelation to John. (Revelation 6:12-13)

In a spiritual sense, Satan will know his time is short. The prophecies speak of him dragging a third of the angels with him in his rebellion. (Revelation 12:3-4) If the Spirit of God stops restraining them, the spiritual heavenly bodies will certainly be shaken. We have never seen such a time, so it is hard to imagine.

³⁰ "At that time the sign of the Son of Man will appear in the sky, and all the nations of the earth will mourn. They will see the Son of Man coming on the clouds of the sky, with power and great glory. Finally, the answer to their question, "What will be the sign of your coming and of the end of the age?" First, all those things will take place, then, at that time, the sign they asked about will appear in the sky. The nations will mourn because they are in rebellion against Jesus. His appearing will be their death knell, but they will refuse to surrender. (Revelation 16:10-11) They will mourn because they will realize that all the prophecies that have been preached to them are true. The day of reckoning will have come. Again, we see the hardness of the heart of man, when he can see with his own eyes and yet remain in opposition to the Giver of all good things. The irrevocable hardness of their hearts will demonstrate itself in their determined effort to defeat God, just as the religious leaders of Jesus' day were determined to kill Him. (Revelation 19:19)

They will see what John saw in the opening chapter of Revelation, ¹² I turned around to see the voice that was speaking to me. And when I turned I saw seven golden lampstands, ¹³ and among the lampstands was someone "like a son of man," dressed in a robe reaching down to his feet and with a golden sash around his chest. ¹⁴ His head and hair were white like wool, as white as snow, and his eyes were like blazing fire. ¹⁵ His feet were like bronze glowing in a furnace, and his voice was like the sound of rushing waters. ¹⁶ In his right hand he held seven stars, and out of his mouth came a sharp double-edged sword. His face was like the sun shining in all its brilliance. ¹⁷ When I saw him, I fell at his feet as though dead. Revelation 1:12-17 (NIV)

To the Hebrews, clouds represent the glory of God. (Exodus 24:15-16) When Jesus ascended in the clouds, the angels said, "*This same Jesus, who has been taken from you into heaven, will come back in the same way you have seen him go into heaven.*" Acts 1:11 (NIV) He is coming back in the same way, but not in the same form. The disciples could stare at Him when He left, but His brilliance will keep anyone from gazing too long at His return. He is the One that Moses gazed at

Commented [notes11]: 8 I looked, and there before me was a pale horse! Its rider was named Death, and Hades was following close behind him. They were given power over a fourth of the earth to kill by sword, famine and plague, and by the wild beasts of the earth. Revelation 6:8 (NIV)

Commented [notes12]: 10 The stars of heaven and their constellations will not show their light. The rising sun will be darkened and the moon will not give its light. Isaiah 13:10 (NIV)

causing His face to glow. (Exodus 34:29) He is the goodness of God, the visible manifestation of the invisible God. (Colossians 1:15)

He came the first time in humility, born in a stable to poor and humble parents. Paul writes that He made Himself nothing, even to the point of taking on the very nature of servant. (Philippians 2:5-7) He came as the Lamb of God to plead with man to repent and receive Him as the Way, the Truth, and Life itself. (John 14:6) He came to lay down His life for the sins of the world. But He is coming back with power and great glory. He entered Jerusalem the last time on a donkey and the foal of a donkey, but He is coming back on a war stallion with myriads of saints. (Revelation 19:11) Out of His mouth proceeds a sharp two-edged sword. A great trumpet will sound and a war cry will go forth. He will not be calling for repentance, He is coming to perform the rest of Isaiah 61:2, "To declare the day of vengeance of our God."

Some people ask how a God of love could judge the earth? How can we reconcile the first coming in such humility and love with the Second Coming in vengeance? Actually, if you will think about it, you cannot have one without the other. Love without justice is merely selfish indulgence. Love without justice has no basis in morality and is therefore immoral. The judge that avoids sentencing the guilty is not only harming society but ultimately further harming the guilty who will go on committing crimes. If there is morality, then there must be judgment. If there is righteousness, then unrighteousness must be dealt with. A just and righteous ruler must punish the guilty for their crimes. If God is good, then He must deal with evil, for evil is opposition to what is good. It was Dietrich Bonhoffer who said, "The only thing necessary for evil to prevail is for good men to do nothing." God did not arbitrarily pick certain actions and call them evil. That which is opposed to His nature, which is good, He labels as evil.

The ones who mourn the coming of the King of Righteousness are those who after numerous signs and witnesses have so irrevocably hardened their heart that they would aim their weapons at God incarnate who gives them life and breath and their very being. God will repay their brutal acts of slaughtering His innocent lambs with vengeance. (Revelations 16:5-7) The same God who held out His hand to them, who hung upon a cross for them, who sent messenger after messenger to warn them, will finally raise His hand in vengeance. A just God would do no less. Universalism, the theology that all will be saved, calls for a compromising unjust god who is willing to live with evil and its destructiveness. That is not the God of the Bible. The God of the Bible hates evil and is angry with wickedness every day! (Psalm 7:11)

Before He pours out His wrath, He will call out those who are His. Just as He took Lot and his family out of Sodom before He destroyed it (Genesis 19:15-16), He will take the elect from the surface of the earth. ³¹ And he will send his angels with a loud trumpet call, and they will gather his elect from the four winds, from one end of the heavens to the other. The Apostle Paul wrote of this day in 1 Corinthians 15. He said that when that last trumpet sounds, we will be changed. We will undergo a metamorphosis. We will have eternal bodies, (1 Corinthians 15:51-52) with eyes that can look upon our glorified Lord. Our vocal chords will be able to sing praise like you have never heard on this earth. He wrote of that trumpet in his first letter to

16 When he hesitated, the men grasped his hand and the hands of his wife and of his two daughters and led them safely out of the city, for the LORD was merciful to them. Genesis 19:15-16 (NIV)

Commented [notes27]: 51 Listen, I tell you a mystery: We will not all sleep, but we will all be changed--52 in a flash, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed. 1 Corinthians 15:51-52 (NIV) the Thessalonians. Listen to what he wrote. ¹⁶ For the Lord himself will come down from heaven, with a loud command, with the voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God, and the dead in Christ will rise first. ¹⁷ After that, we who are still alive and are left will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will be with the Lord forever. ¹⁸ Therefore encourage each other with these words. 1 Thessalonians 4:16-18 (NIV)

Those of us who have died prior to that time will be in spirit with the Lord, but our body will be decomposing here on the earth. When He comes back and that trumpet sounds, our bodies will be reconstituted in a new and different form similar to Jesus' resurrected body. (Philippians 3:20-21) He ate physical food, but He could walk through walls. (Luke 24:41-43; John 20:19) He said He had flesh and bone, but there was no mention of blood. (Luke 24:39) He could appear wherever He was needed.

Those believers who manage to survive until the coming of the Lord will also be transformed and meet Him in the clouds. We will never have to leave His manifest presence again. That is supposed to be encouraging to you. If it is not, you might be living for something else, or your revelation of Christ is lacking.

³² "Now learn this lesson from the fig tree: As soon as its twigs get tender and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. ³³ Even so, when you see all these things, you know that it is near, right at the door. There are many different interpretations for this passage that have to do with the symbolism of the fig tree. Jesus is using a simple analogy. Maybe there is a deeper meaning, but the intended meaning is the obvious one. If you want a sign, He just gave us a bunch of them. When you see them happening, you know the time has come. A fig tree shoots out its leaves toward the end of Spring. When you see those buds and leaves you know Summer is soon to arrive. When you see the signs Jesus gave, you will know the end of the age has come.

Why do we need to know? Just as in 66 A.D. the Christians fled to safety and could carry on their witness, Jesus wants those living in that time to be prepared. He wants them to understand that the time of that chaos is limited and that He will soon come to rescue them. He wants them to be encouraged and not fearful. That is true for every day of our life, (1 Corinthians 10:13) but it will be especially applicable then.

³⁴ I tell you the truth, this generation will certainly not pass away until all these things have happened. This verse has been interpreted to mean that Jesus was speaking to his disciples and telling them that He would return in their lifetime. Some have said that Jesus incorrectly predicted his Second Coming in that generation. There are several problems with that interpretation. Jesus said, two verses later, that no one, including Himself, knew when that day would come, so how could He predict a certain time? (Matthew 24:36) It is incongruent. So what was He saying?

There are two possibilities. One is that the word for generation, *genea*, should have been translated people or race. In other words, the Jewish people will survive until this all comes to pass.

Commented [notes28]: 20 But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Savior from there, the Lord Jesus Christ,

21 who, by the power that enables him to bring everything under his control, will transform our lowly bodies so that they will be like his glorious body. Philippians 3:20-21 (NIV)

Commented [notes29]: 41 And while they still did not believe it because of joy and amazement, he asked them, "Do you have anything here to eat?" 42 They gave him a piece of broiled fish, 43 and he took it and ate it in their presence. Luke 24:41-43 (NIV)

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I prefer another interpretation, and that is that the generation who sees the signs He has mentioned will also see Him return. If you see the natural and manmade disasters increase in frequency and intensity, the abomination of desolation, the world hatred and murder of Christians, the gospel preached in all the world, then know that that generation is the one in which Jesus will return.

³⁵ Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away. Jesus wants us to be assured of this. He began the last verse by saying, "*I tell you the truth…*" He followed it with the assurance that what He says happens. The generation that sees those things can count on His return in that generation. It is by His word that the heavens and the earth exist. (Psalm 33:6) No wonder He can say they will endure longer than heaven and earth. His word is power. It is the sharp two-edged sword that comes from His mouth that will judge the nations. (Revelation 19:15) Isaiah wrote that God's word is eternal. (Isaiah 40:8) It is a lamp to our feet and a light to our path. (Psalm 119:105) It is God's revelation of Himself to us. It feeds our spirit, comforts us in grief, guides us through life, counseling us in difficulty, encouraging us and giving us hope. Does it mean all that to you?

If you are spiritually anemic, it is probably because you are not feeding on the word. If you are stumbling on the path of life, you need to devour more of life's guidebook. If you are bouncing around from one thing to another, unsure of where you are headed and what you are doing, you need the Rock, the Word of God. You cannot read it once a week and expect to grow. By some miracle of God you might cling to life, but you will be so weak that you will be of little worth to the kingdom of God.

There are many anorexic Christians. They eat a little word on Sunday, and then they go about their life as if they never heard it. What does it mean to you today to read of Jesus' prediction of His own Second Coming? It should make us realize that life is short. We had better be living for what lasts. Are your priorities eternal things?

When we see Him come again, we will either mourn or give a great shout of joy. Which will it be for you? We will either be transformed to live forever in His presence or face the vengeance of the LORD. His word is certain, more certain than this earth we stand upon. He is coming again. We will all be on one side or the other. I hope you will choose the love of God so that you will not have to face His just vengeance. Choose goodness over evil. Choose life!

This study about the inevitable end of all things should cause us to examine what we are living for. Is your life just about you? You need to submit to your Master, your Maker. Did you submit long ago and then go your own way? You need to resubmit. And if you find you are balancing in between, maybe you need to recommit this morning. Jesus died so that you might live in Life, in Him, today.
